Survey Title: Is the perception of emergence delirium different between European countries?

Brief Description of Purpose: Emergence agitation still remains an unresolved problem. Although self-limited, it is a considerable source of distress for the child, the parents and the medical staff. It was the aim of the current survey to understand the approach and perception of this phenomenon among British and Italian anesthetists and compare the attitudes of the two European nations.

Outline Findings of Survey: Reported incidence of EA less than 10%. Half of the anaesthetists feel distressed by EA. Sevoflurane is accused as the principal cause. The main treatment options are 'doing nothing' and 'parental presence'. Parents are only informed once EA occurs.

Other Comments: The same survey was performed among Italian anaesthetists. Perception and attitude towards EA differed in some points. However, there were less full-time paediatric anaesthetists among the Italian membership.
