Nominations are sought for three vacancies on APA Council with effect from May 2018.

The election will be held during November and December 2017 and will be conducted by the Electoral Reform Service. Home Members are appointed for four years. The successful candidates will be expected to attend the three full meetings of Council each year (most are held in London) and occasional ad hoc meetings, as required. During their term, Elected Officers are expected to assume responsibility for APA projects and activities, which may include one or more of the following positions:

- Meetings secretary
- Webmaster
- Lead for information for patients and families
- Lead for guidelines
- Linkman lead
- Lead for Audits and Surveys
- Non-specialist advisor (If appropriate base hospital)
- Lead for Peer review
- Involvement in Education and Training or Science committees.

The APA will reimburse expenses according to its agreed policies.

Members wishing to stand can nominate themselves by completing a **nomination form** and obtaining support from two Full or Honorary Members of the APA. Candidates will need to provide a **short supporting statement** (no more than 300 words), which will be circulated with the ballot papers. Honorary Members 2017

Dr Kathy Wilkinson

Saying nice things about Kathy Wilkinson – how hard can that be. Well, very hard as it turns out – not finding nice things to say of course, but getting all the nice things there are to be said into 2 minutes!

Where to start? Kathy's professional life began with joint training in anaesthesia and paediatrics. She obtained her Diploma in Child Health, transferred to anaesthesia at GOS and decided she liked PICU. She already had FRCA, so it was off to the Royal London as an SR for 3 years, obtain MRCPCH and then to Melbourne as PICU Fellow for a year.

She came back as the perfect candidate for an anaesthesia/PICU consultant job at GOS (an almost impossible job with a 1:3 rota, at that time). She was there for 3 years and, along with others started changing the face of intensive care at GOS with a much more 'hands on' approach. They also started retrieval for the first time.

She then had a career change and moved to Norwich – some suggested for a quiet life – they could not have been more wrong!

It was now she started to influence the wider sphere of children's service in the UK.

She was elected to APA Council, as the 1st member from a DGH in 2000, just as the strict membership rules were relaxed. She was immediately made Membership Secretary and removed the need for a job plan from the application process. As a result, the membership increased from 250 to the current level of around 1000. Following this she was Hon Secretary until 2008; always the most difficult job in an organisation. She was then a natural for President and was duly elected in 2011 for 2 years.

In these roles, she added Professional Standards and Education Committees to Council, started a newsletter and an Annual Report, organised regular meetings with the Presidents of RCoA and RCPCH and the National Clinical Director for Children.

Using her influence in the APA and outside she has consistently championed the care of children in the DGH – repeatedly highlighting the evolving crisis in the provision of elective and emergency surgery at local level.

Outside the APA, she was advisor for the 1999 NCEPOD report 'Extremes of Age', has been a clinical advisor for the organisation since 2008, with David Mason, she co-authored the last paediatric NCEPOD report 'Are We There Yet' in 2011, and currently leads the NCEPOD Child Health Review. For the RCoA, she was the lead author for the Paediatric Chapter of GPAS from 2005 – 2016, she leads for safeguarding and has co-edited 2 editions of the National Intercollegiate standards on this subject and is currently lead for Safeguarding PLUS – due next year.

Since everyone else has finally realised there is a big problem, she has just been invited to join the NHS England national review of paediatric surgery and intensive care, so there is no doubt much more to come but I need to stop talking about her achievements here because I need time to highlight a quality that I found to be very special, her pastoral care – Kathy was always the Council member who noted major events in members lives; she sent Christmas cards, congratulations cards and flowers, get well and condolence messages. She is the 'go to' person to ask about significant events of Members and colleagues.

And finally a bit about her: She likes hill and coast walking but I bet you didn't know she enjoys paddling Canadian Canoes and can plough a field with a horse drawn plough? I certainly didn't.

She calls her family - Arthur, Kim and John - long suffering but I'm not sure they are as she'll certainly put at least as much effort into her care for them as she has into everything else in her life.

So, for all these and many more reasons, it gives me great pleasure to propose Kathy Wilkinson for Honorary Membership of the Association of Paediatric Anaesthetists of Great Britain and Ireland.

The citation was given by Dr Bob Bingham, Immediate Past President of the APAGBI at the 2017 Annual Scientific Meeting in Bristol.

Honorary Members 2017

Professor Francis Veyckemans

Francis Veyckemans' life is of upmost interest, and has clearly contributed to his open mindedness and forged his character. Born in Brussels, his father was an accountant and his mother a secretary. He spent all his childhood in Congo, Africa. He graduated from medical school in 1977 and was expected to start in Paediatrics. He declined and instead, with a graduation in tropical medicine, he preferred to go to Burundi with his wife where he was the only doctor in a tiny hospital. He started his anaesthesia training in 1980 and you may wish to know that he did his 3rd year training in 1982 at the "Edinburgh Royal Infirmary". He achieved the Belgium certification in Anaesthesiology in 1985 and for the last 31 years or so, he followed his career at the University Hospitals of Saint Luc in Brussels, where he became a clinical professor in 2000 and was promoted to full professor in 2009. He was deputy chair of the department from 2011 until 2015 and in charge of paediatric anaesthesia and emergency medicine. A new chapter in his life was opened in July 2016 where he faced a new challenge in clinical practice in Lille, France as a senior consultant.

Francis has such a humble but very rich personality that he is impossible to classify. Francis is the most devoted clinician. Francis is a GREAT mentor. He educated and empowered several generations of anaesthetists who were privileged to do their paediatric anaesthesia training with him. He has this unique way of sharing his knowledge. He is a great inspiration to many, including myself. Very didactic in style, his lectures are outstanding with over 200 lectures worldwide and counting. Additionally, he has always a story about a funny case that challenged him and a complication that he had to face. He has a track record of participating in over 25 humanitarian trips all over the world and has tremendously contributed to local education.

Francis' accomplishments and contributions to our specialty are innumerable. He published over 210 manuscripts, most of them related to anaesthesia management and best clinical practice. He edited a series of books on paediatric anaesthesia and wrote over 40 book chapters. More importantly, he initiated and launched the website on anaesthesia and orphan disease and is handling editor for the EIA in this field. He mentored and supervised more than 20 scientific final dissertations and medical thesis. His scientific achievements are outstanding and he is widely respected for his intellect and his scientific integrity. He also served on the board of numerous Societies and is now president of ESPA.

Francis is the smartest and wisest man I ever met. He rarely reacts with anger but his colleagues told me that he once broke a phone in the OR... Another image that his colleagues will never forget is when he rushed to the OR in the middle of the night in his pyjamas! Highly dedicated to his family, he continuously refers to his wife, as being the guide on the road of his life. As such, I would like to share with you his reply to my mail while I was preparing his citation:

"Do not worry about my citation: I am not exceptional. Relation wise, I owe a lot to the woman of my life, Françoise. She corrects my attitude or my words when they may upset or distress people... For the remaining, I try at doing better than I did the day before..."

In recognition of his many achievements in the field of Paediatric Anaesthesia, and on behalf of the APA Council and as overseas representative, it gives me great honour to propose Prof Francis Veyckemans for Honorary membership of the Association of Paediatric Anaesthesia of Great Britain and Ireland.

Francis was unable to attend our Annual Scientific Meeting in Bristol this year. His award of Honorary Membership was made at the ESPA meeting in Glasgow in September, and the citation was given by Professor Walid Habre.





Anaesthesia News January 2001

Dr Gordon Bush

Dr Gordon Bush was honoured at the recent Annual Scientific Meeting in Birmingham and his long-time friend Dr Peter Morris gave an oration, of which the following is an edited version.

G ordon Henry Bush, a native of the environs of the City of Bristol where one of his ancestors had been the bishop in the 16th Century, began his medical studies at Trinity College, Oxford, in 1947, graduating B.M., B.Ch.(Oxon) in 1953. During his time as an undergraduate he distinguished himself as a talented squash player, representing the University at this sport. Following a house officer post at St Bartholomew's Hospital, where he had undertaken his undergraduate clinical training, he entered the RAF medical branch.

His anaesthetic career began in the RAF where he served as a junior anaesthetist in Germany and Halton, from 1955 to 1958. On demobilisation, Gordon Bush travelled to the North West to continue his training in anaesthesia, being attracted to the University Department of Anaesthesia in Liverpool. This department, headed by Professor Cecil Gray, was the only centre at that time offering a formal course of training leading up to the Fellowship examination of the Faculty of Anaesthetists of the Royal College of Surgeons in England. The department was a powerhouse of research into neuromuscular blockade and Gordon Bush actively participated in this research programme, being invited to join the Department as a lecturer after one year.

During his training he was exposed to paediatric anaesthesia and, of course, to Dr Jackson Rees at Alder Hey Children's Hospital. Dr Bush's flair and ability in, and enjoyment of, this branch of anaesthesia was clearly recognised and he was appointed a consultant in paediatric anaesthesia at this hospital in 1964, a post that he held with great distinction until his retirement from clinical anaesthesia in July 1990.

Gordon Bush has been the author of numerous high quality publications and book chapters on many topics in paediatric anaesthesia and intensive care. He was an editorial assistant and assistant editor of the British Journal of Anaesthesia, from 1966 to1971.

A gifted and lucid lecturer, his talents have been in great demand, both in this country and overseas. Gordon Bush has been a visiting professor at many of the major world centres of paediatric anaesthesia and has been an invited speaker at many national and international meetings on most of the continents, delivering inaugural eponymous lectures at the Royal Children's Hospital, Melbourne, the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto and the Sophia Children's Hospital, Rotterdam.

In 1973, Gordon Bush was a founder member of the Association of Paediatric Anaesthetists of Great Britain and Ireland, serving as the Association's first honorary secretary and treas-

urer and, latterly, as its President, from 1987 to 1989. The success of this, the first association in the world to be solely devoted to paediatric anaesthesia, owes much to the sound basis that Gordon Bush helped to put in place in its early years.

Always active in the promotion of paediatric anaesthesia, Gordon Bush, along with others, identified the need to support paediatric anaesthesia in continental Europe, especially in those countries where this was not well developed. In the late 1980s, he was one of the founding fathers of the Federation of European Associations of Paediatric Anaesthesia and served as the second President of the Federation, from 1989 to 1993. During his term in this office, he masterminded several mini-symposia which were very successful and have resulted in the setting up of several national associations of paediatric anaesthesia and an increased awareness of the special needs of children among 'adult' anaesthetists in Europe.

In 1991, a new international specialist journal, Paediatric Anaesthesia, was launched. It is a measure of Gordon Bush's eminence in paediatric anaesthesia and the high respect that he is held in by the world fraternity of paediatric anaesthetists that he was invited to be the founding editor.

Gordon Bush is a true gentleman and an ambassador of the highest order for British anaesthesia worldwide. Throughout his remarkable career he has enjoyed the steadfast support of his family and his wife Kaye. Now in his second, or is it his third retirement, I am reliably informed that Gordon relishes looking after his many grandchildren. Without doubt, he must be the best qualified baby sitter in the country!

It is a privilege and a great personal pleasure to present to you Gordon Henry Bush for election to Honorary Membership of the Association of Anaesthetists of Great Britain and Ireland.



Paediatric pre-operative care conference 2017 Nadia Ladak Sheffield

Over twenty paediatric pre-operative care teams, tertiary and district general hospitals, from around the UK, came together at Sheffield's Town Hall on the 15th September to compare children's pre-operative pathways, share best practice, develop guidelines and further their understanding of paediatric pre-operative care. The Medical Protection Society talk on "Shared Decision Making" gave clinicians a framework through which they can support patients to make informed decisions about their own care. During this talk the paediatric pre-operative nurses, play specialists and managers explored the different pre-operative pathways, the benefits and challenges with each model. Other subjects covered included information provision, pre-operative management of obesity, diabetes, clotting disorders, electronic screening, clinical coding, and the very popular seamless surgery board game, which illustrated the various bumps in the surgical pathway and potential improvements to avoid these.

The feedback received from delegates showed the day's success, with over 98% rating the event as excellent, very good or good:

"Networking, good mix of disciplines and the right level of knowledge in the room....different activities planned depending on discipline. Also, made to feel very welcome, the atmosphere created was a friendly and open one, I felt able to talk freely." A paediatric pre-assessment nurse

The information gained from this conference and involvement in the national Paediatric Pre-Operative Care network will benefit the individual hospitals and the development of a paediatric pre-operative care nationally.

I have only recently taken over the brief, which includes both guidelines and patient/ parent information.

Firstly, the good news. The Prevention of Thromboembolism Guidelines are now available on the website. Well done to everyone involved.

The APA is currently looking at the way it provides guidelines. I thought it worth stating the principles I feel we should be following in this review.

- It is a right and proper thing for an organisation such as the APA to be involved in guideline writing and promotion. The objective is to provide advice to members based, as far as possible, on the best available evidence.
- APA Guidelines are not standards. The objective is not to promote a uniform approach to paediatric anaesthesia but to point to 'best practise'. We need to be mindful that, in an era of increased regulatory oversight of clinical practice, our guidance is not taken out of context and should not stifle reasonable innovation.
- Formal evidence based guidelines take a considerable amount of time and effort to produce. This may mean that they are unresponsive to areas of practice, which change rapidly. There is a need to look at alternative ways to get important messages out in a shorter timeframe without 'dumbing down' the content. It should be absolutely clear which guidance is current and which is now out of date or superseded by other guidance produced by others or ourselves.
- We should make use, and provide links to, guidance produced by other organisations. It should be clear how the APA has been involved in their production and what our view is to as to the validity of the guidance to paediatric anaesthesia.

The plan to make a major update the APA website provides us with an opportunity to examine this area. Hopefully there will be more news in coming months.



National Tracheostomy Safety Project

The Paediatric arm of the National Tracheostomy Safety Project (NTSP) has gone from strength to strength this year:

They have worked hard to increase the use of bed-head signs up and down the country, as well as train health care workers in the care of children with tracheostomies. Their "train the trainers" course has been run successfully with the ALSG in Salford and has trained Consultants through to Support Workers how to teach their own colleagues to care for children with tracheostomies as well as how to manage emergencies.

September has seen publication the Journal of Clinical Otolaryngology of a paper demonstrating improved patient safety and outcomes following the implementation of their work in a tertiary children's hospital.

"SafeguardingPlus" was launched by the Royal College of Anaesthetists in September 2017. Here is a short summary of the project:

'SafeguardingPlus' contains four introductory pages – 'Safeguarding Children', 'Safeguarding Adults', 'Consent and Ethics for Children and Young People', and 'Consent and Ethics for Adults'.

These in turn link to shorter pieces on specific topic areas, including; Confidentiality, Duty of Candour, Restraint, and DNACPR, with integral signposting to well-developed and up-to-date guidance. These pages can act as a reliable quick reference guide and will prove valuable in patient care as well as for personal and departmental CPD. A team of about 12 clinicians, from different specialty areas has collaborated on the project (with medico-legal expertise being provided by, Janice Barber, Senior Partner at Hempsons), led by Dr Kathy Wilkinson and Natalie Bell.

Both the APA and the RCoA hope the new webpages will provide a one-stop-shop to support anaesthetists with any safeguarding concern, or related consent or ethical issue in the perioperative setting, wherever they work in the UK. They contain key references, bespoke resources (podcasts/film/virtual cases) and links to other useful materials (e.g. open access articles and e-Learning).
