#### **President's Report**

The T piece starts a new year which sees the NHS undergoing the usual battles through the winter pressures, increased demand for paediatric anaesthesia input in and out of the operating room and unresolved issues around seven day working and contracts. While the core business of the Association of Paediatric Anaesthetists is to support education, standards and development of those who are involved with anaesthesia of infants and children undergoing anaesthesia, it is hard not to be influenced by the current issues facing the profession. This probably is a very important time for all us: occasional practitioner, trainee or specialist in paediatric anaesthesia to maintain

close ties with the APA. Our website continues to expand providing key information on current issues, and the work of the education committee led by Mark Thomas and professional standards led by Bob Bingham maintains a strong source of information and guidance. We look forward to a full Belfast Annual scientific meeting (May 4-6<sup>th</sup>) complete with a half-day Trainee meeting on the Wednesday at nominal cost, parallel streams of lectures on the Thursday and Friday, workshops and a great social programme. Maintaining contact through membership of the APA is vital at this time so that we can support each other. We recently sent out a membership survey, which will

help Council direct efforts and activities in the next year. However, we are always happy to respond to direct contact, suggestions and calls for advice and contact details are on the website. My e-mail address is awolfbch@aol.com and I while I may take a few days to get back to you, I will respond as soon as I can. As the APA has evolved over time, the make up of membership and Council has changed considerably from a smaller group of specialist paediatric anaesthetists, to a much broader base that reflects the wide spectrum of paediatric anaesthesia. The current Council reflects not only the different environments where paediatric anaesthesia is undertaken but also the regional approaches to practice across Great Britain and Ireland. We also get valuable input from an elected overseas representative, at present held by Walid Habre from Geneva. It is essential that the APA Council continues to be an inclusive group and in order to maintain this "freshness" there needs to be a regular intake of new Council members who have the ideas and enthusiasm to take paediatric anaesthesia forward. This has become increasingly important as children with complex needs are not just found in large specialist centres and ways need to be found to integrate care throughout regional networks and ways found to maintain skills and knowledge. I would therefore urge those from both specialist and mixed practice to consider applying for Council election later this year when vacancies will occur. Personally, after 15 years associated with Council I still find it really stimulating to work with a

group of enthusiastic individuals as we try our best to support the profession and practice of paediatric anaesthesia.

We have had some changes on Council in the last few months. Karen Bartholomew who is no stranger to APA council through her work with the linkman scheme is now an elected member to Council. We also welcome Dr Richard Marks, Vice President of the Royal College of Anaesthetists and Dr Upma Misra Council member of AAGBI and on the Editorial Board of Anaesthesia. Both are co-opted to strengthen our ties with these two important national bodies and collaborate on matters paediatric. For many years, the APA provided Peer review of paediatric anaesthetic practice at the request of anaesthesia departments in order to evaluate all aspects of paediatro anaesthesia and its adjacencies with a view to help the local team improve their practice. This aspect of our work was much approved and admired by many of our colleagues in other specialties. Recently, the RCoA has begun rolling out a similar scheme of quality improvement through peer review that can be applied universally to all hospitals. This process of Anaesthesia Clinical Services Accreditation (ACSA) has drawn much from our own experience of peer review and Simon Courtman has put a huge amount of work wit the RcoA in establishing appropriate paediatric needs within the core domains of the ACSA process. Another current active collaboration is a joint project with the RCoA led by Alistair Cranston and Kathy Wilkinson to develop a microsite for Safeguarding level 3 training for anaesthetists. These

collaborative projects all bode well for close integrated working across the Anaesthetic organisations with the APA providing a central touchstone for specialist advice and input in paediatric anaesthesia.

2015 has been a good year for research within the APA. Not only were two paediatric anaesthetic projects given Grant funding by the National Institute for Academic Anaesthesia (NIAA), but also, the results of a previous APA commissioned and funded research project, the "pain at home study" was published in the journal Pediatric Anesthesia. Sally Wilmshurst, from Great Ormond Street, who has been appointed by Council to lead the development of Quality Improvement (QI) methodology in paediatric anaesthesia, is currently working on how to help different departments to set up and undertake QI projects in the future. Sally gave a brief presentation of her vision on how to roll out this project at the recent Council meeting, and now she has been tasked to set out a blueprint of how individual departments can organise and roll out their initial QI projects. Please watch out for this development on the APA website. We are also aiming


to help these projects get off the ground and will be working out how to do this in the next few months as the process develops. This year also saw the formation of the Paediatric Anaesthesia Trainee Research Network (PATRN) led by Dr Elin Hughes who is the trainee rep on Council in collaboration with Drs Zoe Harclerode and Anna Barrow. They have already started work on some simple projects and following useful informal discussions with the paediatric surgical trainee network we hope that some more complex collaborative studies could be undertaken in the next couple of years.

I look forward to an energetic 2016 with a brilliant Belfast Annual Scientific Meeting. We will let you know what you have come up with as priorities for the Association from the membership survey. Meanwhile, if this is more convenient, let us have your ideas for new projects and areas you think we need to concentrate on in the next couple of years, and do consider whether you might want to apply for election to Council in the future.

### **Scottish Snippets**

This has been an interesting year for paediatric anaesthesia in Scotland with the opening of the Royal Hospital for children in Glasgow, the hosting of the APA in Aberdeen and the retirement of one of the previous APA presidents Dr Neil Morton.

#### SPAN:

The Winter Education meeting entitled "Critical Care Update" on the 11<sup>th</sup> of December proved popular. The central location and varied topics drew a large group of paediatric enthusiasts from around the country. The meeting consisted of lectures in the morning sessions and a series of workshops in the afternoon.

The next AGM will be held on the 13<sup>th</sup> of May 2016 in the Teachers building in Glasgow with video-conferencing being available on request. Further details and outline programme will be available on the span website: www.span.scot.nhs in due course.

Scotland has had an excellent response to the call for inclusion in the **Apricot** study with all hospitals submitting data. Dr Tom Engelhardt will hopefully present some of the findings at the next AGM.

#### **SCCCSS**:

Mr Fraser Munro has now succeeded Mr Roderick Duncan as chair of this group of Paediatric Specialty Consultants. There continues to be problems recruiting into paediatric surgical specialty posts such that the long-term retention of such services is an increasing concern. A short life working group has been collating a paper looking at how to ensure training enables and informs the future generations of paediatric surgical specialists. A report form this should be available in the near future.

#### NSD:

National services division has recently set up a new group whose remit is to audit the Managed Clinical Networks within Children's Surgical Services to ensure children are receiving the best care possible.

#### MEPA / MEPA-FC:
